Phonics and decoding (Word Reading)	Read individual letters by saying the sounds. Blend sounds into words, so that they can read short words made up of known letter/sound correspondences. To refer to authorial style, overall themes (e.g. triumph of good over evil) and features (e.g. greeting in letters, a diary written in the first person or the use of presentational devices such as numbering and headings).
